# ADVANCED PLACEMENT WORLD HISTORY: MODERN 2020-2021 Syllabus

Welcome to Advanced Placement World History: Modern! While this school year is extremely different, it offers new educational opportunities. I am excited to learn new lessons, implement more technology, and share our experiences under these unique circumstances. If questions or concerns arise at any point, please feel free to contact me. I would like to ensure that each student is granted the tools, access, and opportunities to succeed in this course.

AP World History: Modern is an introductory college-level history course. In this class, we will develop an understanding of the patterns and developments of modern world history from 1200 CE to present. Students will be asked to read and analyze historical sources, make connections through discussion, write historical arguments as they explore historic developments and concepts.

# AP World History is divided into four time periods of study.

<b>PERIOD 1-</b> Regional and Interregional Interactions (1200 - 1450)	Stearns, Chapters 7-16
PERIOD 2- Global Interactions (1450 - 1750)	Stearns, Chapters 17-23
<b>PERIOD 3</b> - Industrialization and Global Integration (1750 - 1900)	Stearns, Chapters 24-28
<b>PERIOD 4</b> - Accelerating Global Change & Realignments (1900- present)	Stearns, Chapters 29-37

# The course content is organized into commonly taught units. The units have been arranged in a logical sequence frequently found in many college courses and textbooks.

<b>UNIT 6 -</b> Consequences of Industrialization (1750-
1900)
<b>UNIT 7 -</b> Global Conflict (1900-present)
UNIT 8 - Cold War and Decolonization (1900-
present)
<b>UNIT 9</b> - Globalization (1900-present)

<u>THEMES</u> – "The themes serve as the connective tissue of the course and enable students to create meaningful connections across units. They are often broader ideas that become threads that run throughout the course. Revisiting them and applying them in a variety of contexts helps students to develop deeper conceptual understanding." <sup>1</sup>

- 1. **Social Interactions and Engagement** The process by which societies group their members and the norms that govern the interactions between these groups and between individuals influence political, economic, and cultural institutions and organization.
- 2. **Political Organization** A variety of internal and external factors contribute to state formation, expansion, and decline. Governments maintain order through a variety of administrative institutions, policies, and procedures, and governments obtain, retain, and exercise power in different ways and for different purposes.

- 3. **Innovations and Technology** Human adaptation and innovation have resulted in increased efficiency, comfort, and security, and technological advances have shaped human development and interactions with both intended and unintended consequences.
- 4. **Cultural Developments and Interactions** The development of ideas, beliefs, and religions illustrates how groups in society view themselves, and the interactions of societies and their beliefs often have political, social, and cultural implications.
- 5. **Economic Systems** As societies develop, they affect and are affected by the ways that they produce, exchange, and consume goods and services.
- 6. **Environment and Human Interaction** The environment shapes human societies, and as populations grow and change, these populations in turn shape their environments.

## **Grading:**

The grade that students earn in this course consists of multiple factors. Tests and quizzes are administered frequently to both assess the students' knowledge, but also prepare students for the AP Exam itself.

Students will be assigned several essays and research assignments throughout the year. In order to prepare students for the AP Exam, essays will be timed and written in class.

Class participation and preparation on Zoom are important. Students will be graded on their preparation for class discussions and debates.

Grading is as follows: A=90% and above

B= 80%-89.9% C= 70%-79.9% D= 60%-69.9% F= 59.9% and below

GPA will be bumped up for a grade of A, B, or C

A=5, B=4, C=3. D or F grades do not receive GPA bump ups.

## First Offense:

In addition to the consequences outlined in the First Offense, the following may occur:

- 1. (1) day class on-campus suspension.
- 2. Zero on the assignment.

## Third Offense:

In addition to the consequences outlined in the First Offense, the following may occur:

1. Referral to an administrator for suspension (2-3 days) with parent conference.

## How can you avoid plagiarism?

- 1. Do your own assignments individually unless otherwise instructed by teacher.
- 2. Do not aid another student in cheating by letting them copy your work.
- 3. Write down the complete citation information for each item you use.
- 4. Use quotation marks when directly stating another person's words.
- 5. Always credit original authors for their information and ideas.

### The AP Exam:

The date for the AP World History exam is Monday May, 10 2021. This date is set by the College Board and is not negotiable. We must complete the curriculum, learn the required test skills and complete our review by then. Please note: there is a fee to take the test. (The exam fee was \$97.00 last year. For eligible students, there is a reduced fee program. See the AP website for details).

Please note that College Board recently announced the following change to the AP exam ordering process. This year students will decide whether or not to take exams and order their exams by October 30, 2020. A deposit of \$40.00 will be due by October 30, 2020. The rest of the fee will be due March 1, 2020. ALL STUDENTS WHO REGISTER AFTER NOVEMBER 15, 2019 WILL BE CHARGED A \$40.00/EXAM LATE FEE.
