

#### **Instructional Routine**

Introduce

- Introduce this activity by asking a focus question about amusement park workers. For example, ask, "What is something amusement park workers do—help with games or check out books?" Discuss students' responses.
- Remind students that the Kinder family plays a variety of games in Chapter 5. The games people play at an
  amusement park are run by people who work at the amusement park. People have to set up the games and make
  sure they are working correctly. Amusement park workers follow directions to set up the games, clean them and
  make repairs if necessary.
- Tell students that they will complete a job task as an amusement park worker by following directions to make and set up a Ring Toss Game. For example, say, "Your job today is to complete a job task as an amusement park worker and follow directions to make a Ring Toss Game."
- Review the learning goal with students: I will follow directions to make a Ring Toss Game.

- Tell students that they are amusement park workers who are in charge of making and setting up a Ring Toss Game. Explain to students that they will use the Ring Toss Game they make during Midway Field Day (Lesson 14).
- Display the Ring Toss Game Directions. Model each step of the directions to make a Ring Toss Game. Picture/Word Cards are included to support communication and to be used as visual supports for the activity.
- When you get to Steps 2 and 3 of Ring Toss Base, show students how to use a ruler to measure and mark 1/2 inch slits on the paper towel tube. Depending on the needs of your students, consider whether the slit marks will need to be premeasured and if the slits should be precut.
- When you get to Step 1 of Tossing Rings, encourage the students to decorate the rings with different designs, such
  as stripes or polka dots.
- When you get to Step 2 of Tossing Rings, show students how to cut out the center of the plate. Depending on the needs of your students, consider whether the plates should be precut prior to the students painting them.
- When the Ring Toss Game is complete, demonstrate how to set up the Ring Toss Game and how to throw the rings.
   Have students practice throwing the rings at the base in preparation for Midway Field Day.

Provide Practice Provide students with the Ring Toss Directions, the materials to make the Ring Toss Game and Picture/Word Cards, if necessary.

- **Level 3:** Have the student independently follow a multi-step sequence of directions to complete a job task by making the Ring Toss Game.
- **Level 2:** Have the student follow directions to complete a job task by making the Ring Toss Game using picture or physical supports.
- **Level 1:** Have the student actively respond to supported directions of a job task while participating in making the Ring Toss Game. For example, show the student a paper plate and ask, "We have to paint the paper plate. Find the paper plate." Have the student use their active response mode to respond to the direction.

Review

- Have students discuss their experience in making the Ring Toss Game. Ask the students: "What did you enjoy
  about making the Ring Toss Game? What was hard for you to do?"
- Have students research other jobs that people do at an amusement park and what job tasks they complete.
- Save the students' Ring Toss Games to use during Midway Field Day (Lesson 14).




## Ring Toss Base:


1. Paint and decorate tube and top of one plate. Let dry.




2. Measure and mark 5 (½-in) slits on bottom of tube.



3. Cut each slit.




4. Fold tabs out. Tape tabs onto base plate.






# **Tossing Rings:**


 Paint and decorate tops and bottoms of remaining paper plates. Let dry.



2. Cut out center of plates.



3. Using chalk, make a line to stand behind a few feet away from base.



4. Take turns tossing the rings over the tube.
