Part One: Chapter 1 (pages 1-20)

Day 1

- 1. What impression do you have of this world? Describe, based on descriptions so far of technology, architecture, clothing, names, etc.
- 2. What type of government is in place? (INGSOC stands for English Socialism, page 2.)
- 3. What seem to be the four most important buildings in London?
- 4. Winston lives in "Victory Mansions," drinks "Victory Gin," smokes "Victory Cigarettes," hears "strident military music" in a city with "bombed sites" and sees "All war films." What does this imply to readers? (pgs. 1, 3, 5, 7, 8)
- 5. Describe Winston Smith, the novel's protagonist. What does he look like? What type of person is he? What is his personality? Is he happy? What is his life like? What does he think about? What does he do?
- 6. How would you describe Winston's diary entry? Consider the subject, the words, tone, etc. What does this tell us about him? "Prole" is short for proletarian, which means a member of the working class or a worker. (9)
- 7. Describe Emmanuel Goldstein and the Brotherhood. (11-16)
- 8. "Two Minutes Hate." (9) How is this used to manipulate people's emotions? How does Winston react?
- 9. Describe O'Brien. (10, 11, 17)
- 10. What is your opinion so far of the novel? Are you interested to read more?

Appendix: The Principles of Newspeak (pages 299-312)

Day 2

- 1. What is "newspeak?" Describe a bit. What is it doing to language?
- 2. How long does the appendix imply that Oceania and Ingsoc survived? 1984 is a bleak and dark dystopia, but phrases such as "For the future, for the unborn" (7) can offer a bit of hope. Margaret Atwood, author of *The Handmaid's Tale*, says that the appendix to 1984 is hopeful and a glimmer of optimism. Analyze.
- 3. Tell a bit about the "A vocabulary." (301-303)
- 4. What is "B vocabulary?" (303-309)
- 5. What do you think of "newspeak?"

- 1. Describe the building in which Winston lives.
- 2. What are kids like in this world?

- 4. What does Winston dream, and what does he remember of his family & childhood? What might it mean for Winston that "his memory was not satisfactorily under control?" (34)
- 5. What are "Physical Jerks?" How is Winston's physical health?

Note: Rage Against the Machine's song "Testify" uses, "Who controls the past, controls the future: who controls the present, controls the past." (34)

- 1. Winston works in the Records Department of the Ministry of Truth (Minitrue Recdep). What does he do? Does he enjoy his work?
- 2. "The great purges" (44) and "The two of them must evidently have been swallowed up in one of the first great purges of the Fifties" (29) might refer to what?
- 3. Describe Syme. He is first introduced on page 48.
- 4. Describe Tom Parsons. Mrs. Parsons mentioned him in Chapter 2, and he appears starting on page 55.
- 5. Is there any truth in the phrase "our new, happy life" (58) for Winston? Explain.

Chapters 6 & 7 (pages 63-81)

Day 5

- 1. How are Party members supposed to view sex?
- 2. Who is Katharine? She is first mentioned on page 64.
- 3. What is the difference between Party members and proles? Which group is larger?
- 4. What is the Party description of Capitalism?
- 5. Who are Jones, Aaronson & Rutherford, and what happened to them? They are first mentioned on page 75.

Chapter 8 (pages 81-104)

Day 6

- 1. Why is individualism (ownlife) discouraged?
- 2. What happens when a "steamer" roars into the street?
- 3. Why does Winston go into a pub to buy an old man beer?
- 4. Describe Winston's experience in the little junk shop.
- 5. What does Winston briefly consider doing after he sees the dark-haired girl? What does he do instead?
