SAT & ACT Requirement UPDATES

The University of California will not consider SAT or ACT test scores when making admissions decisions or awarding Regents and Chancellor's scholarships. If you choose to submit test scores as part of your application, they may be used to determine your eligibility for the California statewide admissions guarantee, as an alternative method of fulfilling minimum requirements for eligibility or for course placement after you enroll.

There is no standardized test requirement for UC admission.

(Test Optional for high school class of 2021 and 2022, then test blind)

While SAT subject tests are not required, some campuses recommend that freshman applicants interested in competitive majors take the tests to demonstrate subject proficiency.

Example: Berkeley College of Chemistry and College of Engineering: Math Level 2 and a science test (Biology E/M, Chemistry, or Physics) closely related to the applicant's intended major.

SAT & ACT Requirement UPDATES

The California State University (CSU) will continue to temporarily suspend the use of ACT/SAT examinations in determining admission eligibility for all CSU campuses for the 2022-2023 academic year. This temporary change of admission eligibility applies for the following terms: Fall 2021, Winter 2022, Spring 2022, Fall 2022, Winter 2023 and Spring 2023 admission cycles. First-time freshmen must meet the following eligibility requirements be a high school graduate or equivalent; complete the 15-unit comprehensive "a-g" pattern of college preparatory course; and earn a qualifying "a-q" grade point average (GPA) as described below.

California residents and graduates of California high schools will be eligible for admission by earning a 2.50 or greater "a-g" GPA. Any California high school graduate or resident of California earning a GPA between 2.00 and 2.49 may be evaluated for admission based upon supplemental factors such as number of courses exceeding minimum "a-g" requirements, household income, extracurricular involvement, and other available information that would inform the campus admission decision. Each CSU campus will determine the supplemental factors used with GPA to determine eligibility in these cases and communicate these criteria publicly for prospective students.

The California State University is committed to helping high school and community college students to overcome college admissions challenges caused by COVID-19. The CSU has taken steps to ensure students are not adversely impacted by these disruptions and can achieve their CSU education as scheduled.

Test Blind vs Test Optional

Test blind: they don't factor test scores into admissions decisions even if students submit scores.

Test-optional policies are more of a gray area and can differ from one school to another.

Test optional: students can choose whether or not to submit SAT, ACT, and other test scores for consideration.

How will this affect the Class of 2022 and beyond?

Most of the test-optional policies adopted by colleges and universities this year are intended to last only one year. However, a number of schools had already been considering making the jump to test optional, and some of those are launching longer pilot programs—for example, Tufts University will be launching a three-year pilot program and reevaluating after that, and the University of California system announced a five-year plan that includes test optional, then two years of test-blind admissions for residents, culminating in the creation of their own test.

For the most part, we expect that we will not know about testing policies for the class of 2022 for quite some time (hopefully spring) so we encourage juniors to approach the testing process as they normally would.

Understanding Financial Aid

Financial Aid is any sort of money that is used to help a student pay for college. This includes **grants**, **scholarships**, and **student loans**. This money can often be used toward tuition, books, and other school related expenses.

When is the annual Financial Aid Night?	HHS holds an annual Financial Aid Night in the fall.
What agency can I contact for more information regarding financial aid?	Contact the California Student Aid Commission at 1-800-433-3243 or www.csac.ca.gov
What is the Financial Aid Website?	www.fafsa.gov
Does it cost money to apply?	No - It is FREE! (Please use the above web address, as other links will charge you an application fee)
What does FAFSA stand for?	Free Application For Federal Student Aid
When should I apply?	You can begin the application in the Fall (October 1) of your SENIOR year
Do I have to apply every year?	Yes, students must submit a FAFSA for each year they plan on attending college. March 2nd is the Cal Grant deadline. Some colleges will have an earlier date. Check with each college that you apply to.

What's the difference between a Student Loan and a Grant/Scholarship?	Student loans must be repaid (usually with interest); grants/scholarships are not repaid. So make sure not to borrow more than you need! Learn more at studentloans.gov and studentaid.gov
What are Cal Grants?	Cal Grants are state-funded, need-based, cash grants given to California college students or student who qualify under AB540 CA Law. This will help pay for tuition and other school needs
How can I apply for a Cal Grant?	Once you complete the FAFSA/Dream Act application (by March 2nd) you will automatically be considered for the Cal Grant (once your GPA verification has been submitted)
Cal Grant A	Low to middle income students who have a 3.00 high school GPA minimum, have a financial need, meet the income and assets requirements, and are working towards an Associates (AA) or Bachelors (BA/BS) degree
Cal Grant B	Low income students who meet specific income and assets requirements, have financial need, 2.00 high school GPA minimum, and are working towards an Associates (AA) or Bachelors (BA/BS) degree
Cal Grant C	Low and middle income students who meet the income and assets requirements, have financial need, enroll in vocational courses of study, and are working towards an Associates (AA) degree or a certificate/vocational program

What is the California Dream Act?	The California Dream Act Application is the Financial Aid application for certain documented & eligible undocumented students
What is the Chafee Grant for Foster Youth?	The California Chafee Grant Program provides up to \$5,000 annually to foster youth and former foster youth to use for college expenses. To qualify, a student must have been in foster care between their 16th and 18th birthday. Students must complete the Chafee Grant application at chafee.csac.ca.gov and the FAFSA application . If you have specific questions please call (888)224-7268
If I am a DACA student do I complete the FAFSA?	NO! DACA students (Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals) for Deferred Action should complete the Dream Act Application and NOT the FAFSA.
What is "COA"?	Each college has its own cost of attendance , or COA, which includes: <i>tuition, fees, books, supplies, housing, food, transportation</i> , and other <i>personal expenses</i> for the school year
What is "EFC"?	Your expected family contribution , or EFC, is the amount of money the government calculatesout that you and your family could reasonably contribute toward your college education for the year

- 1st Undergraduate program
- Income ≤ \$184,000
- Assets ≤ \$184,000
