



JACK ADAMS

"The Voice of the Lions" (Contributor)

Jack Adams came to the Brentwood area in 1951 and has been an outstanding citizen who has worked hard to give something back to the community and make it a better place to live.

Jack, along with his wife Jeanne, has been "the Voice of the Lions" and has been announcing football games since 1952 (40+ years). He has always worked closely with the Liberty athletic staff and administration to make Liberty home football games a first class presentation. As the announcer and public address person, Jack prepared thoroughly for each and every game.

Starting in 1948, Jack took over the chairmanship of the annual Lions Club Football Banquet from Judge Joe Silva. He continues in that capacity today. Jack was also the Chairman of the 50th Anniversary Year Football Banquet that honored the Most Valuable Football Players of the last 50 years. This was a very large task, and it was a huge success.

In 1990, the L.U.H.S. Marching Band honored Jack at halftime at a home football game by dedicating the program to him. He was honored for all of his contributions to the Liberty football program and other athletics as well as for his dedicated service in helping the band during uniform drives in 1963 and in the 1980's.

Jack and Jeanne have twice been honored as the L.U.H.S. Homecoming Parade Grand Marshals.

Jack and Jeanne were chosen Brentwood Citizens of the Year in 1987 for contributions to the city and the community.

Jack has been honored as Lion of the Year twice. As a Lions' Club member for 40 years, Jack has held all of the local offices in the club and has been a district officer (Alameda and Contra Costa Counties).

The Annual Lions Club Speech Contest has been chaired by Jack for 25 years at L.U.H.S. as well as the junior contest at the middle school level.

He was Lion's Carnique Chairman in 1954, and for a period of 20 years he was Co-Chairman. He was responsible for the fireworks display on the 4th of July -



he is a certified pyrotechnic engineer.

Jack was an original member of the board of directors that formed the Brentwood Recreation Department in the mid-1960's. That board of directors hired Lou Bronzan and Teddy Ohmstede as recreation directors.

Jack went to high school at El Centro High School in the Imperial Valley. He was his class president and president of the debating team. He played end on the football team, both on offense and defense. On the track team he ran the half-mile, the mile, and was on the mile relay team. He held the Imperial Valley mile record for many years. From 1938-39, he attended Cal Poly San Luis Obispo; from 1939-42, he attended U.C. Davis and earned his B.S. Degree. While in college, Jack dropped football and concentrated on track running both the one-mile and two-mile events.

Jack retired from the State of California Department of Labor where he was manager of the East County Employment Department.

For his long and dedicated service to L.U.H.S. and the community, it is fitting and proper that Jack Adams be inducted into the L.U.H.S.D. Athletic Hall of Fame.

KEITH DAWSON


(Coach)

In 1958 Coach Dawson came to Liberty Union High School. He had already been a highly successful coach at Oakdale High School and was coaching at Tracy High School prior to coming to L.U.H.S. Coach Dawson has coached continuously at Liberty for 34 years - this is a record at Liberty. He has coached with outstanding success in track, football, swimming, cross country, and wrestling. Coach Lou Bronzan and Ted Ohmstede went looking for a coach who could coach wrestling because Liberty was trying to start a wrestling program. Coach Dawson was recruited because he had already been an outstanding wrestling coach at both Oakdale High School and Tracy High School. In fact, he helped to establish wrestling in the Central Valley. Coach Dawson initiated the wrestling program in 1965 and coached that sport until 1977 when Liberty dropped the sport.

Since he has been at Liberty, Coach Dawson has coached his track teams to six consecutive E.B.A.L. Track Titles (1964 - 1970); he coached the 1967 and 1969 wrestling teams to E.B.A.L. Co-Championships. He coached Carlos Romero who was Liberty's first ever State Wrestling Meet placer (6th place). In 1977, the track team won the F.A.L. title, and Coach Dawson also became the Cross Country Coach for both the boys and girls. In 1978 and 1979 the Frosh-Soph Track Team won the F.A.L. Championship. In 1979-80 he became Head Coach for both Boy's and Girl's Track. Many of his athletes have competed in North Coast Section and State Meets both in track and wrestling.

In 1984, Coach Dawson was selected for the prestigious North Coast C.I.F. Honor Coach Award for Track.

Coach Dawson attended Sonora High School where he was an outstanding all-around athlete lettering in football, basketball, and track. After high school in 1943, Keith entered the United States Navy and served as a destroyer sailor during World War II. Upon returning from the service, Coach Dawson attended Modesto Jr. College and lettered in football in 1947 and 1948. Coach Dawson enrolled at the College of Pacific where he played and lettered in football and track in 1949 and 1950. He played end on the 1949 unbeaten and untied C.O.P. football team that went 10-0 and was ranked nationally. The 1949 football team was inducted



into the U.O.P. Hall of Fame in 1990. In 1966, this team was inducted into the Stockton Athletic Hall of Fame. In 1950, Coach Dawson was selected as one of the Top 500 Collegiate Athletes in the Nation.

After graduating from College of the Pacific in 1951 with a B.A. Degree in P.E., Coach Dawson went on to get his M.A. Degree and his teaching credentials.

He serves as the Northern California Representative to the Fresno Relays. Coach Dawson retired from L.U.H.S. as a P.E. teacher in 1986. He relinquished Cross Country Coaching at that time, but he remains Head Track Coach.

Coach Dawson has been an outstanding coach and teacher. He has always been an excellent role model for the youth of the area. His hard work, dedication, integrity, loyalty, and coaching knowledge and skills have endeared him to many coaches, parents, and above all, all of the athletes he has coached throughout the years.

Because of his dedicated service and outstanding contributions to the Liberty athletic program, it is fitting and proper that Keith Dawson be inducted into the L.U.H.S.D. Athletic Hall of Fame.

MANUEL TARANGO

(Athlete)

Manuel Tarango was one of the finest all-around athletes to ever compete in athletics at Liberty Union High School. His exploits at Liberty were certainly very outstanding especially in football and track. He was also an outstanding basketball player.

He lettered in football in 1950, '51, '52, and '53; in track 1951, '52, '53, and '54; in basketball 1950, '52, and '53 (he missed the 1951 season because of the flood in Knightsen and severe illness). While his exploits in football as a running back were outstanding, his track feats were amazing. He ran the 100, 220, and 440 yard events while at Liberty and was outstanding in each. He also excelled in the long jump.


During his senior year, Coach Ferrill decided to move him from the 100 yard event and concentrate on the 220 and 440 yard runs and the long jump. He went on to win all three events at the E.B.A.L. Meet. Manuel anchored the 880 yard and mile relay teams that won both these events at the Alhambra Relays in 1953. The 880 yard Relay Team won in 1:36.2 for a new school record; the Mile Relay Team won in 3:40.0 to set a new meet record. Manuel was also the first winner of the L.U.H.S. Decathlon Championship in 1954 with 4063 points.

Manuel was selected the Most Valuable Backfield Player and the Most Valuable Football Player in 1953. He also was presented the Scholastic Award Trophy at the Annual Football Banquet. He was the first football player in Liberty's history to win both the Most Valuable Player and the Scholastic Award Trophy.

After leaving L.U.H.S., Manuel went to East Contra Costa College (now D.V.C.) where he played football and ran track. He won the League Meet in both the 200 and 400 meter runs.

Manuel went on to Chico State after E.C.C.C. where he played football and ran track for two more years, 1957 and 1958. Manuel holds the record for the longest touchdown pass reception at Chico - 88 yards, the record still stands! In track, Manuel was even more outstanding. In 1958 he won the Far Western Conference 400 meter run in 48.4 and the 200 meter run in 21.5 (a school and league record that lasted 25 years). Manuel also led the Mile Relay Team to a League and School Record of 3:19.1.

After college, Manuel played football at Fort Campbell, Kentucky with the 101st Airborne Division. The team played many of the State Colleges in the area.



While at Liberty, Manuel was active in many clubs; he was president of the Block L Society for two years - '53 and '54; he was a member of the C.S.F. and the Student Council.

Manuel earned his B.A. Degree from Chico State and his M.A. Degree from Stanford University. He earned his Secondary Administrative Credential from the University of San Francisco.

Manuel currently teaches Spanish at Rincon Valley Junior High School in Santa Rosa. He is the Athletic Director and the Track and Cross Country Coach. He is also a state level soccer referee (Class 5).

For his outstanding achievements in athletics at Liberty and in college at Chico State, the L.U.H.S.D. Athletic Hall of Fame is proud to induct Manuel Tarango.

ROBERT MAIOCCO

(Athlete)

In 1974 a young athlete burst upon the Liberty Union High School athletic scene who was to become one the most outstanding athletes in the history of the That young athlete school. was Robert Maiocco. He was a fine all-around athlete who was outstanding in track, football, basketball, crosscountry and swimming. Robert will be remembered most by the impact he had on rewriting the track record book at Liberty. Also, while at Liberty, he established himself as an outstanding state and national A.A.U. Age Group Champion. Robert did not swim at Liberty because of the conflict with track, but he was able to swim in summer age group meets and his ability was outstanding. While



at Liberty, Robert earned varsity letters in track, football, and cross-country. In basketball, Robert was the Frosh Team Captain and Co-Most Valuable Player. On the J.V. Basketball Team he was Team Captain and Co-Most Valuable Player. On the Frosh Football Team, Robert was the leading scorer. He was selected All-F.A.L. Wide Receiver in 1977 and was All-East Bay Wide Receiver - Honorable Mention in 1977. He was selected to the Contra Costa County All-Star Team in 1978. Robert was offered football scholarships to Texas Christian, Dartmouth, and Cornell Universities. Robert swam in the Diablo Valley League, and at the League Championship Meet in 1974 he won the 50 yard freestyle event in 23.2 for a league record which still stands in 1993. He also anchored the record setting 200 yard relay with a 22.5 split.

However, it was in track that Robert left his most impressionable mark. He was selected as Liberty's Most Valuable Trackman for an unprecedented four years. He is also Liberty's record holder in the 220 and 440 yard events plus running on the Mile Relay and Medley Relay Teams that set school records. He was the Captain of the

Liberty Track Team. In the 440 event Robert went undefeated for four years. He was also participating in A.A.U. meets throughout California and elsewhere in the United States. In 1976 and 1977, he was first place in the 440 yard A.A.U. Age Group California Championship and the Runner-up in 220 yards in both 1976 and 1977 and set a new L.U.H.S. Record of 22.0 in 1977. In Akron, Ohio, 1976, Robert won the A.A.U. National Age Group Championship 440 yard run and set a National A.A.U. Age Group Championship Record of 48.89. In 1977, he was runner-up in the same event in Albuquerque, New Mexico in 48.2. He ran a sizzling 46.9 anchor split on the relay team and also ran a 10.0 100 yard and a 22.1 220 yard individual events at the same meet. At Liberty, Robert was a very valuable asset at invitational and relay meets. A short review of those meets are as follows:

Robert was a life-time member of the California Scholarship Federation and won the Scholarship Cup in 1977. He was President of the Block "L" Society, Rotary Student of the Month, and a four time winner of the Parker Robb Award for an Outstanding Athlete. He was twice winner of the Parker Robb "Super Sport" Award.

Robert went on to Stanford University on a four year track scholarship where he won the Block "S" Award for four straight years. He was Track Team Captain in 1981 and '82. He won the 110% Award in 1980. He won the 800 meter run at the "Big Meet" against California. He was on the Freshman record setting 4 x 400 Meter Relay Team and the Varsity Indoor Distance Medley Relay Team. Robert graduated from Stanford with a B.A. Degree in Economics and earned his M.B.A. Degree in Finance from U.S.C.

For his outstanding athletic record at L.U.H.S. and Stanford University, the L.U.H.S.D. Athletic Hall of Fame is proud to induct Robert Maiocco.

JERRY MILLER


(Coach)

Jerry Miller arrived on the Liberty Union High School Campus in 1964 and coached J.V. Football and J.V. Basketball. He was an immediate success as a teacher and coach. In 1965, Jerry became Assistant Varsity Football Coach to Jack Ferrill and helped to coach the Undefeated-Untied 1965 Team. helped coach the 1969 Team that was unbeaten. Both teams won the E.B.A.L. Championship. Jerry continued to coach football until 1974. Jerry became Varsity Basketball Coach in 1966 and immediately faced a challenge of bringing a program that was down and building it into a winner and contender. A new era of Liberty basketball began. In 1970 Jerry's first great team emerged - they were 21-4. During the time from 1967 to 1970, he developed many outstanding players - most Jerry's first basketball notably, Mike Rozenski. championship team was the 1979-80 season with another great player, Scott Barnes. Jerry's teams won three consecutive basketball titles in the F.A.L. from 1982-84 with a 33 game win streak (1982-'83 & '84). His 1984 Team played in the Championship game at the North Coast Sectional Championships at the Oakland Coliscum. Jerry was selected F.A.L. Basketball Coach of the Year in 1982, 1983, and 1984. From 1974 to 1980 Jerry Coached both J.V. and Varsity Softball and won three Championships between 1977 and 1980.

Jerry went to Orland High School where he excelled in basketball, baseball and football. In 1957 and 1958 he was selected All-Westside League in basketball and baseball. In 1958, was named to the All-Northern California Team by the San Francisco Chronicle. He went to Chico State College and again excelled in three sports; in 1962 he was named to All-Far Western Conference First Team in Baseball; Second Team All-Conference in Football and Honorable Mention in In 1962 he was the Team Captain in Basketball. Basketball. After college Jerry signed with the San Francisco Giants and played one year for the Salem Giants in the Appalachian League. In 1989 Jerry was inducted into the Chico State Hall of Fame for his outstanding athletic feats among which was being named All-Conference in three sports his senior year.

In 1986, Jerry left Liberty to accept a position as a full-time Assistant Basketball Coach at the University

of the Pacific. While he was at Pacific, the Tigers won 17 games in 1986 and went to the P.C.A.A. Championship Tournament. Following tenure at Pacific he was Assistant Basketball Coach at Sonoma State College from



1988 to 1989. The 1988-89 Sonoma State team won the League Championship and went to the Division II West Coast Tournament (N.C.A.A.). In 1990, Jerry was named the Men's Basketball Coach at Solano College. In 1991-92 Jerry had his first winning season with a 17-13 record.

In both 1991-92 and 1992-93, his teams have gone to the State Junior College Basketball Tournament. In 1992, the Solano team won the D.V.C. Invitational Tournament.

Jerry coached for 21 very successful years at Liberty, and there is no doubt that he is the winningest coach in the history of Liberty basketball. He is the only person to coach a Liberty Boy's Basketball Championship Team since the early 1940's. He was a fine teacher, coach, and gentleman. He was an unselfish, dedicated, loyal basketball coach, but was equally as great as a football coach. Much of Coach Jack Ferrill's success over the years was due to the outstanding job of coaching that Jerry Miller did. He worked to make every athlete the best they could be.

Jerry received his A.B. Degree and Secondary Teaching Credentials from Chico State, and he earned his M.A. Degree from San Francisco State.

For his outstanding coaching records plus his many contributions, service, and dedication to Liberty, it is fitting that Jerry Miller is inducted into the L.U.H.S.D. Athletic Hall of Fame.

RON NUNN (Athlete)

Ron Nunn received a very high accolade when Coach Lou Bronzan stated, "If I were to select an All-Liberty Football Team, Ron would be one of the backs on that team. I believe Ron was one of the most complete players I have ever seen or coached."

For three years Ron lettered in Varsity Football at Liberty. He was selected to receive the Ted Ohmstede Outstanding Back Award in both his junior and senior years. In his senior year (1950), he also won the Most Valuable Player Award. In 1949, he was selected to the All-North California Prep Team - Honorable Mention. In 1950, the San Francisco sportswriter, Darrel Wilson, selected Ron as one of the top Northern California players.


His exploits in football at Liberty include the following: scoring 25 touchdowns in two seasons and passing for 10 touchdowns. Twelve of his touchdown runs were for over 30 yards -one was for 80 yards and another for 75 yards. He led the 1949 team to a perfect 5-0 league mark for the championship, and in 1950, he led an outstanding team to an 8-1 season (losing only one game to Livermore in the last few seconds).

Ron was a complete football player. He was an excellent runner and fine blocker who was also an outstanding pass receiver. He was also a fine punter. A throw-back to the triple-threat backs of the 20's, 30's, and 40's, Ron was a fine passer and an outstanding defensive player. He was truly a complete football player.

Ron also lettered in Varsity Basketball in 1948, '49 and '50 and in Varsity Track in 1948.

Ron was an excellent student and was a member of the California Scholarship Federation (C.S.F.) and the Liberty Honor Roll. He was the C.S.F. Scholarship Chairman.

After high school, Ron played semi-professional football in Antioch for the Antioch Hornets and was a star player there. Against the Oakland Rams, he scored three touchdowns. He then went on to Stanford University and played on the Frosh Team. He transferred to the College of the Pacific and played there



in 1953.

Ron returned to Brentwood after college and entered the family farming business where he has been outstandingly successful. He has been the leader of the new apple industry in the Brentwood area. Ron has also been a very successful businessman and developer in the Brentwood area - developing Apple Hill, an upscale community, with Blackhawk.

Because of his caring and philanthropy, the new year-round school in the Brentwood Union School District was named the Ron Nunn School.

Because of Ron's outstanding athletic feats in high school, college, and at the semi-pro level and his business leadership and success as well as his community service and philanthropy, it is fitting that Ron Nunn be inducted into the Liberty Union High School District Athletic Hall of Fame.
