



David Borjon Athlete

David Borjon attended Liberty Union High School from 1954 to 1958. While at Liberty he was a three sport letterman - football, track, and basketball. In football, Dave took over as the premier running back when Herm Urenda graduated. He earned two Varsity letters and was chosen Channel 13 Certificate Player of the Week, Union 76 Sports Achievement Player of the Week, and 2nd Team All-League. "Dancin' Dave" had an excellent season in 1957 when he scampered 61 yards for a touchdown on the first play from scrimmage against Pacifica. He gained an amazing 247 yards in 17 totes for better than a 14 yard average. Against Amador, Dave ran for 195 yards in 19 carries - he scored on runs of 35 yards and another of 50 yards all in the fourth quarter. In his first three games of the season his 512 yards total ranked him second in the North State area rushing. Without a doubt, Dave was one of Liberty's finest football players.

In track, Dave earned three Varsity letters and one J.V. letter and won the Block "L" Outstanding Trackman Award in his senior year. In basketball, he played three years earning two J.V. letters and one Varsity letter. In 1958 Dave was selected for the L.U.H.S. Yearbook Award for the Outstanding Athlete of the Year.

When Dave graduated from Liberty, he went on to Chico State College where he was also a three sport standout. He played football from 1958-62 earning Block "C" letters each year. He was a member of the Chico State track team for three years. Dave split his playing time in football between running back and defensive back, starting both ways. As a member of the school's track team, he ran the 440 yard run and participated in the steeple chase, winning All-Regional honors in that event. Dave was outstanding in both football and track, but he found his special niche in sports as a collegiate boxer. As a middleweight boxer, Dave won the California Collegiate Boxing Conference title three years in a row and was named to the All-Conference team those three years. In 1959 Dave was the Chico State Middleweight Champion. Dave lost only one match during his three year boxing career at Chico State. In 1961 Dave was named to the All-America National Intercollegiate Boxing Team. In 1991 Dave was inducted into the Chico State Hall of Fame for his athletic feats and his contributions to his community. Dave graduated from Chico State with a B.A. in



education and earned his General Secondary Credential. He went on to teach and coach in Kelseyville, California. In 1971 he was selected Lake County Coach of the Year in football by his fellow coaches.

Dave is also active in varied volunteer organizations and projects which involve the arts, speech, drama, and sports. He has been an enthusiastic and talented leader in the Lions Club and other community groups. Dave is deeply involved with local theater groups.

David Borjon's greatest contribution has been to the youth of his community. He is always available to talk to young people and assume an active role in enriching their lives. He never tires of doing things for others especially when children are involved.

Dave is married and lives in Kelseyville, California, with his wife, Mary. They have two grown children, Joseph and Mary. Dave now teaches at the Kelseyville Continuation High School where he has a well-deserved reputation as an excellent and understanding teacher who is especially effective with disadvantaged and troubled youth.

Because of his outstanding athletic ability at L.U.H.S. and at Chico State and his dedicated service to his community as an educator and civic leader, it is with great pride that we induct David Borjon into the L.U.H.S.D. Athletic Hall of Fame.

Stephen Bronzan

Athlete

Stephen attended Liberty Union High School from 1967 to 1971. While at Liberty he was a letterman in Frosh football and three years in Varsity football. In baseball he earned a J.V. letter and three Varsity letters. Steve was a two-way first team All-E.B.A.L. selection in football during his senior year as a middle linebacker on defense and a center on offense. He was Co-Captain of the Varsity football team and winner of the Ted Ohmstede Most Valuable Lineman Award. He played on the 1969 L.U.H.S. football team that went 7-0-2 and were the undefeated co-champions of the E.B.A.L. In his three year Varsity baseball career he was a second baseman, and he played on the 1970 L.U.H.S. Championship baseball team.

After high school, Steve went on to University of California at Davis where he had a very successful football career. He played on the U.C.D. 7-0 Frosh level championship team and was chosen All-League Northern California Frosh Football League. Steve played on three Far Western Conference Championship teams while at Davis. In 1973, he won the Coaches' Award for the Most Improved Player. He won All-Far Western Conference honors as a middle linebacker his senior year. He also won All-Coast status during that season and called the defenses for the Aggies.


After his playing days at U.C. Davis, Steve started his coaching career there in 1976 as the defensive coordinator of the J.V. team and later became Varsity team linebacker coach; the teams he coached won five more Far Western Conference championships.

Steve then went on to coach four years at Portland State University as the linebacker coach, special teams coordinator, and defensive coordinator.

Steve returned to California in 1984 to coach at C.S.U. Chico where he served three years as the Wildcats' defensive back and kicking coach. In 1988 Steve was the offensive coordinator at C.S.U. Chico. This coaching experience on both sides of the ball enhanced his knowledge of the game of football.

Steve returned home to U.C.D. in 1989 and has been the defensive coordinator for the Aggies for six years and the teams have won four championships and finished the 1993 season ranked 7th in the nation. Steve also teaches physical education classes at U.C.D. and this year started a Theory of Coaching class.

Steve has conducted football camps and is a frequent speaker at workshops and clinics. He has



also authored numerous magazine articles on defensive football.

While at Liberty, Steve was a member of California Scholarship Federation, Honor Roll, Scholastic Top Ten, Student Council, Block "L" Society and was the Senior Class President. He was a graduation speaker in 1971.

Steve graduated from U.C.D. with a B.S. degree in physical education and earned his teaching credential. He later earned his M.S. in physical education from Portland State.

Steve and his wife, Shelley, live in Davis with their two sons, Mathew and Robbie.

It is with a great deal of pleasure and pride that the L.U.H.S.D. Athletic Hall of Fame inducts Stephen Bronzan for his outstanding accomplishments and contributions to L.U.H.S. and U.C.D. football.

Tara Clark

Athlete

When talking about the sport of swimming at Liberty Union High School the name Tara Clark evokes memories of a young woman who had impeccable swimming credentials which epitomized excellence in all areas of the sport. Her swimming career at Liberty was fantastic! From the day she arrived until she graduated, this young woman dominated the sport of swimming as no other swimmer has - male or female. She dominated all freestyle events from 50 yards to 500 yards while excelling in the 100 yard butterfly - smashing all previous school records.

Tara attended L.U.H.S. from 1985-89 and while there won Varsity swimming letters all four years. She was selected Most Valuable Swimmer all four years, and she was selected as a L.U.H.S. Athlete of the Week once every year that she attended Liberty.

Tara won a coveted F.A.L. Championship in the 100 yard freestyle in 1987 as a sophomore with a time of :55.01 seconds. She was the first Liberty swimmer to win an individual championship in the F.A.L. That year she also narrowly missed setting a national record in the 100 yard butterfly event with a time of :57.46 seconds - the national record was :57.39 seconds.

In her senior year, Tara was All-D.F.A.L. in swimming with a first place in the 50 yard freestyle with a time of :24.73 seconds and a second place in the 100 yard freestyle with a time of :54.03 seconds. Her performance in these two events earned her the No. 2 and No. 4 seeds in those respective events at the North Coast Section Meet. When Tara won the 50 yard freestyle championship at the D.F.A.L. meet, she became the first Liberty swimmer to win an individual event in this tough league. At the N.C.S. meet, Tara went on to place second in the 50 yard freestyle and third in the 100 yard freestyle in the finals. This was an outstanding and impressive finish to Tara's N.C.S. swimming career which started when she qualified as a freshman in 1986 and qualified and placed all four years. No other swimmer male or female - has accomplished such a feat in the 44 years of competitive swimming at L.U.H.S.

In 1989 Tara was chosen Honorable Mention All-America in the 50 yard freestyle for her time of :24.7 seconds. She was chosen All-America for her time of :52.12 seconds in the 100 yard freestyle. She was also honored by being selected to the 1989 Academic All-America Swim Team. She was also chosen to the All-America Teams in 1986 and 1987.

While swimming for Liberty, Tara also competed for the Delta Waves Swimming Team in Antioch. Swimming for that team she accomplished the following: a multiple qualifier for the JuniorNationals, a Senior National qualifier in 1990 (she was the first Delta Waves swimmer to qualify for this meet), National Age Group Top 16, Pacific Swimming All-Star, and swam in the National Junior Olympics in 1987, 1988, and 1989.

Other awards Tara received while in high school

include the 1989 Scholar Athlete Award, the L.U.H.S. Scholastic Award in recognition outstanding scholarship from 1988 to 1989, and the N.C.S. -CIF Scholar Athlete Award. Tara was also a life member of California Scholastic Federation. She was active in schoolleadership



serving as the Freshman Class Treasurer, the Junior Class Secretary, and the Senior Class President.

Tara continued her education and swimming at the University of Nevada Las Vegas where she was awarded a full four year athletic scholarship. She was the first Liberty woman athlete to achieve this honor. At U.N.L.V. she was the Rookie of the Year in 1989. She was Captain of the U.N.L.V. Womens' Team in 1993. In 1990-93 she was a Big West Conference Champion and record holder. She was the top U.N.L.V. 50 yard and 100 yard freestyle sprinter in 1990-91. In 1991 and 1992 the U.N.L.V. Womens' Team was the Big West Conference Champions. Tara swam on the 1990 U.N.L.V. Freestyle relay and 1993 Medley relay teams that set both school and Big West records.

Tara continued her academic excellence at U.N.L.V. She was a Scholar Athlete 1990 to 1994, on the U.N.L.V. Dean's Honor List 1991 to 1993, a Big West Conference Scholar Athlete 1990 to 1994, and in the U.N.L.V. Honors Program 1989 to 1993.

While competing for U.N.L.V. Tara was a Senior National Qualifier and a U.S. Open finalist in her freshman year. This was an extremely exciting event for a freshman swimming against the best female swimmers in the nation. Tara graduated from U.N.L.V. with a B.S. degree in secondary education with emphasis on mathematics and business and now lives in Las Vegas where she teaches mathematics at Cashman Jr. High School and coaches both the mens' and womens' swimming teams at Silverado High School.

Because of her outstanding swimming and academic careers at Liberty Union High School and at the University of Nevada Las Vegas, the L.U.H.S.D. Athletic Hall of Fame is extremely proud to induct Tara Clark.

Fami

For over 68 years, the Stonebarger family name has been associated with outstanding service and athletic contributions to Liberty Union High School.

Gene Stonebarger was the first family member to attend Liberty Union High School. He graduated in 1940. While at Liberty, Gene competed in basketball and track as a freshman, sophomore, and junior. As a track team member, he competed in the 100 yard dash, low hurdles, 440 relay, and the shotput. Gene was also very active in other school activities as a member of the band and orchestra. He served as F.F.A. Secretary in his sophomore and junior years and F.F.A. President in his senior year. He was Junior Class Vice-President. After graduating from Liberty, he went to the University of California at Davis on a two year non-degree program in agriculture before entering the U.S. Army Air Corps. Besides being active in sports and other activities while at Liberty, Gene has been a strong supporter of athletes and coaches since his graduation and upon returning from World War II. He has been a great father and husband and role model for his five children and the community.

Ruth Stonebarger was a tough competitor in tennis competing during her junior and senior years in both singles and doubles at Strathmore High School. There is a very strong suspicion that all of the Stonebarger children got their competitiveness from her. She is still able to beat any of her children in a game of tennis. She was as tough as they come. Ruth has always been very supportive of her children and Liberty - always giving positive reinforcement and giving rides, feeding the athletes, and helping at school and athletic functions.

Jeannie was the oldest of the five children and attended Liberty from 1958-61. She attended school when there were no interscholastic sports for girls, but she was nevertheless highly active in girls' sports and other school activities. She was active in the Pep Club, the Careers in Education Club, the Spanish Club, the Quest Club, and the Rally Committee. She was a member of the Girls' Athletic Association and the Girls' Block "L" Society. Jeannie was a fine student and member of the Honor Roll while serving as a songleader and Junior Class Secretary. She was very active in modern dance. She also was an important member of the Liberty athletic program by serving the coaching staff as a charter in both football and track. Jeannie lives in Stockton and has a grown son who lives in Memphis, Tennessee.

Frank was the oldest son to attend Liberty where he had an outstanding athletic record over the entire four years. As a freshman he played and lettered in three sports - Frosh football, Frosh basketball, and J.V. baseball. As a sophomore, he played Varsity basketball earning his Varsity letter and made second team All-E.B.A.L., and he also swam on the "B" swimming team. In his junior year, Frank lettered in Varsity basketball and was selected first team All-E.B.A.L. with a 20.9 points per game scoring average, and he set a single season scoring record of 378 points and was selected the Most Valuable Player and Captain. He scored more than 30 points in six different games. Frank also earned his Varsity swimming

letter as a backstroker. During Frank's senior year, he earned letters in four Varsity sports. He played wide receiver on the Varsity football team and was selected as an Honorable Mention All-E.B.A.L. In Varsity basketball he was selected second team All-E.B.A.L. and was the leading scorer in the league with an 18.5 point per game scoring average. He continued swimming and earned his Varsity letter, and he also lettered in Varsity track as a high jumper. Frank was selected as the Yearbook Athlete of the Year in his senior year, and he was chosen to the Liberty All-Decade Basketball Team for the 1960's. He was also chosen Honorable Mention All-Quarter Century East Bay Basketball Team. While in high school, Frank was active in the Pep Club, the Rally Committee, the Spanish Club, the Block "L" Society, and the Student Council; he was Frosh Class Vice-President, Sophomore Class Vice-President, F.F.A. Secretary and was a State Farmer. He was also a member of the Honor Roll.

Frank went on to the University of California Davis upon graduation where he played basketball on the Frosh team - he was Captain. He was a three year Varsity player at U.C.D. playing on the three Far Western Conference Championships and three appearances N.C.A.A. Division II Regional play-offs. He was Honorable Mention All-Conference for three years and was the fourth leading scorer in U.C.D. basketball history. He was also Co-Captain his senior year. Frank graduated from U.C.D. with a B.A. in psychology and earned an M.A. in physical education. He taught and coached at Winters High School for two years. He now lives in Linden with his wife Marsha where he is engaged in farming. He still coaches he coached his son Gene in football, and is currently coaching his daughter, Allison, in basketball at Linden High School.

Larry Stonebarger was a fine all-around athlete who was one of the toughest competitors in the history of

Liberty athletics. His intensity, heart, and pure "guts" were second to no one. As a freshman in 1963, he lettered in Frosh football and was selected as the Most Valuable Player. He was the Frosh basketball team Captain, and was the Frosh baseball team Most Valuable Player. In his sophomore year, Larry was the J.V. football team Captain and Most Valuable Player, and he was the Most Valuable Player on the J.V. basketball team. As a sophomore he lettered in Varsity baseball and was selected for the Outstanding Team Player Award and second team All-E.B.A.L. As a junior in 1965, Larry played on the undefeated-untied football team where he was the back-up quarterback and a defensive back. He also earned his Varsity letter in basketball. On the 1966 Varsity baseball team, he was selected first team All-E.B.A.L. and won the Outstanding Hitting Award. During the 1966 football season was the starting quarterback and a defensive back. He was voted first team All-E.B.A.L. and was the team's Outstanding Back and the winner of the Most Valuable Player Award. That year Larry passed for 878 yards. He received a severely torn knee ligament injury in the last game of the season against Amador for the league title his injury and inability to play defense was a serious loss to the team and most assuredly cost the team the title. He refused to be taken out on offense. The next morning, he had major surgery. Larry rehabilitated himself and came back to play in the second half of the basketball season. During the 1967 baseball season, Larry was first team All-E.B.A.L. and the team's Most Valuable Player.

After leaving Liberty, Larry went to the University of Idaho and was the starting quarterback on the Frosh team. He transferred to Diablo Valley College his sophomore year and was selected first team defense in the Golden Gate Conference. He was also selected as the Outstanding Player of the Year in G.G.C. His team went to the state playoffs that year. After leaving D.V.C., Larry

went on to San Jose State where he was a two year starter in football on defense. Larry graduated from San Jose State with a B.S. degree in physical education with a minor in sociology. He now lives in Linden where he is engaged in farming and is the Operations Manager for Sierra Hills Packing Company. He and his wife, Maureen, have three children who are active in sports.

Glenn followed in his older brothers' footsteps by being an all-around athlete. During his frosh year 1967-68, he lettered in Frosh football and Frosh basketball and also earned his letter in J.V. baseball. In his sophomore year of 1968-69, he lettered in J.V. football, J.V. baseball and J.V. basketball and was named the playmaker of the year. In Glenn's junior year, 1969-70, he played on the Varsity football team that beat Antioch 30-13 and went on to tie Amador for the E.B.A.L. Co-Championship. That year he also lettered in Varsity basketball. In 1970-71, his senior year, he was a member of the Varsity basketball team that had a 21-4 record which was the best ever record for Liberty and finished second in the league. He lettered on the Varsity football team that went 6-2-1 and second place in the E.B.A.L. He also lettered in Varsity golf his senior year. While at Liberty, Glenn was very active in school activities, such as the Spanish Club, the Boys' Block "L", the Boys' Block "L" Sergeant at Arms, F.F.A., F.F.A. Reporter, the Rally Committee, Freshman Class Vice-President, and Frosh-Soph Hop King Runnerup. After high school, Glenn went on to Hartnell College where he played basketball for two years and was selected All-League, Most Valuable Player, and Team Captain. Glenn graduated from Hartnell J.C. with an A.A. degree and attended Chico State. He now lives in Brentwood with his wife Jeannie and their two sons. He is a partner in G and S Farms.

Sandy was a big fan of her three brothers, but she was also a fine athlete in her own right. In her freshman year, she lettered in J.V. softball. She was also a Frosh Cheerleader and a Varsity Cheerleader for basketball. As a sophomore in 1977-78, she was again on the J.V. softball team, but she ended the season on the Varsity team. She was a Varsity Cheerleader and was a member of the Top 5 Homecoming Queen Contestants. She attended San Joaquin Delta College and Diablo Valley College. She currently resides in Brentwood with her three children. She is employed as the Office Manager for G and S Farms.

Liberty is blessed to have had this family of outstanding athletes, citizens, leaders, and boosters among its alumni. A tradition of greatness and service that has not diminished from "Grampa Frank" to Gene through to the youngest, Sandy. Roy Ghiggeri

Athlete - Coach

From the day Roy Ghiggeri entered Liberty Union High School, he was destined to become one of the school's finest basketball players. attended Liberty from 1964 until 1968. He played Frosh basketball in 1964-65 and won his letter and was chosen the Most Valuable Player. He also lettered in Frosh baseball that year. During the 1965-66 season played on the J.V. basketball team and earned his letter. He earned Varsity letters in his junior and senior years. Roy was chosen the Most Valuable Player on the 1967-68 Varsity team and was chosen All-E.B.A.L. He was the second leading scorer in the E.B.A.L. with a 19.0 point average per game. Also, he was chosen to the All-East Bay Team and was named to the All-Tourney teams at the Rio Vista Tournament and the Amador Tournament. In 1972 Roy was named to the L.U.H.S. All-Decade Basketball Team -1960 through 1970.

After high school, Roy received a full basketball scholarship to the University of Pacific. He played on the dynamic and outstanding teams of the early 70's. On the Pacific Frosh team, Roy was chosen captain and was selected to the All-Northern California Frosh Basketball Team. He earned his Varsity letter during his sophomore year while playing on a team that was Co-Champions of the W.C.A.C. in 1969-70 and rated in the top 20 in the national polls. He was Player of the Week against University of Nevada Reno. During his junior year in 1970-71, he played on a Pacific team that won the P.C.A.A. Championship and was ranked in the top 10 nationally and went on to play in the Western Regionals placing third. In 1971-72, Roy won his third Varsity letter and was the team captain. He was selected Player of the Week against Drake University. He was awarded the Mr. Team Award, the Leadership Award, and the Tenacity Award, as well as the Team Captain Trophy.

When Roy graduated from the University of the Pacific after a successful college career, he came home to Liberty to teach and coach basketball. He coached Frosh basketball from 1974-76 and J.V. basketball 1976-82. He served as Assistant Varsity Basketball Coach to Jerry Miller from 1975-82. His 1975-76 Frosh team won the F.A.L. Championship, and he won J.V. championships in 1976, 1979, and 1982. Roy taught social studies and physical education until he became the Director of the L.U.H.S. Adult Education Program from 1978-88. Since 1988, Roy has been Director of the L.U.H.S.D. Alternative Education Program.

From 1982-88 Roy served as L.U.H.S.

Athletic Director and Student Activity Director and was founder of L.U.H.S. Leadership Program. While he was the athletic director, he instituted the Lou Bronzan Wrestling Tournament,



the Frank Stonebarger Basketball Tournament for boys and girls, the 2.0 rule for all extra-curricular activities prior to the state mandate, the "Athlete of the Week Award," the monthly head coaches meeting, and he started the baseball hit-a-thon and the basketball shoot-a-thon to raise money for the athletic program. Roy also directed and coached the recreation basketball clinic for 8-12 year olds for the Brentwood Recreation Department from 1988-92.

In high school Roy was an honor roll student every semester. He was the Liberty Union High School Sophomore Class Vice-President in 1965. He was on the Dean's list at U.O.P. in 1971.

Roy graduated from U.O.P. with a B.A. degree in physical education and a minor in social sciences in 1972. He earned his California Secondary Credential from U.O.P. in 1973 after doing student teaching and coaching at Stagg High School in Stockton, CA. His Junior Varsity team was 20-1and won the Sac-Joaquin Section Championship. In 1984 he received his M.A. degree in education and a California Administrative Credential from St. Mary's College. In 1992 he finished the California School Leadership Academy for administrators.

While Roy was L.U.H.S. Athletic Director, he was president of the F.A.L. Athletic and Activity Directors, a member of the California State Athletic Directors Association, and a member of the Northern California Parker-Robb selection committee for student/athlete scholarship awards.

Roy lives in Brentwood with his wife, Angela, and his two children, Stacie and Joseph.

Because of Roy Ghiggeri's life long commitment to the community and the L.U.H.S.D., plus his outstanding high school and collegiate athletic careers, the L.U.H.S.D. Athletic Hall of Fame is pleased and proud to induct him into the Hall of Fame.


Richard "Dick" Linn

Athlete

Dick Linn is a Byron native who attended Liberty Union High School from 1957 to 1961. During that time he became an outstanding football player and basketball player who left an indelible mark on Liberty sports.

In 1957 Dick earned letters in both J.V. football and basketball, and in 1958 he earned a J.V. letter in football and a Varsity letter in basketball. In 1959 he earned his letter in Varsity football and was Honorable Mention He was unable to play All-E.B.A.L. basketball his junior year because of a broken left hand. In 1960-61, his senior year, he lettered in Varsity football and basketball. He earned first team All-E.B.A.L. honors in football and second team All-E.B.A.L. in basketball. He was selected to the second team All-Metropolitan Team in football. He was also selected to the Sporting News High School All-America Football Team. He is one of only two football players to achieve that honor at Liberty. He was selected as the Lions Club Most Valuable Player and won the Ted Ohmstede Most Valuable Lineman Award. He was also nominated to the North-South Prep Shrine Game in Los Angeles, but he turned down the opportunity because of the necessity of work. The same reason kept him from accepting college offers. September of 1994, Dick was selected to the Contra Costa Times All-Time High School Football Team along with such football greats as John Henry Johnson, Seabern Hill, Duane Putnam, Herman Urenda, Bruno Banducci, Dan Colchico, Ron Pritchard, and Jim Turner all of whom went on to become professional football players.

Dick was considered a "total package" for a tight end. He was a devastating blocker who had soft hands who could run with the ball when he caught it. He was a two-way player who was an overpowering defensive end who could rush the passer or contain the run. He had the perfect defensive mentality during the game he was aggressive and mean, and he arrived at the point of attack in



a bad humor. He was a coach's dream - big, fast, strong, coordinated, and aggressive.

Dick lives in Byron with his wife, Patricia. They have four children, Paul, Elizabeth, Veronica, and Reuben. He works as a carpenter and a walnut rancher.

The L.U.H.S.D. Athletic Hall of Fame is proud to induct Richard "Dick" Linn into the Hall of Fame for his outstanding and impressive athletic career at Liberty Union High School.


