

RONALD J. ENOS

Athlete - Coach

Ron Enos is one of the finest all-around athletes to attend Liberty High School. Ron attended Liberty from 1960 to 1964 and was outstanding in three sports football, basketball, and baseball. Ron lettered in "B" basketball in 1961-62 and varsity basketball in 1962-63 and 1963-64. He was named to the All-E.B.A.L. basketball team in 1963-64. Ron earned his varsity baseball letters in 1963 and 1964 as an outstanding third baseman. He was selected on the All-E.B.A.L. baseball team in 1964. As fine a basketball and baseball player as Ron was, it was in football that he really excelled. He was a quarterback with a fantastically strong arm as well as a fine touch; he could throw the bomb as well as the short check off passes with great skill. Ron was a smart quarterback and an outstanding team leader. He was tough and strong and could run when needed. He lettered in Frosh football in 1960 and JV football in 1961. He earned his first varsity football letter in 1962. His senior season in 1963 was exceptional. Ron was awarded the Ted Ohmstede Award for the Outstanding Backfield Player and the Lion's Club Award as the Most Valuable Player. Ron was a unanimous All-E.B.A.L. first team selection, and he was chosen first team on the mythical All-Inland Empire Team which covers the Sacramento and San Joaquin Valley areas adjacent to the Bay Area. Ron was also chosen second team on the All-Metropolitan Team covering the greater San Francisco Bay Area and was chosen to the fourth team All-Northern California. He was the second ranked passer in Northern California, but he was the leader in most touchdown passes thrown - 18. Ron holds the passing record for Liberty High School that was set in the 1963 season - 98 completions in 196 attempts for 1,344 yards and 18 touchdowns. Ron was chosen to the Liberty All-Decade Football Team 1960-1970 at the quarterback position. During his senior year Ron was chosen All-League in three sports - baseball, basketball, and football. Only a very few athletes have ever attained this high honor while playing for Liberty High School. After high school Ron attended Diablo Valley College where he lettered in football in the 1964 and 1965 seasons. He was selected the Most Valuable Player at D.V.C. in 1965 and was named to the Golden Gate Conference All-Conference Team. Ron then entered the U.S. Army during the Vietnam War, and in 1967 he was selected to play on the 3rd Army All-Star



Softball Team. He also played basketball for the Fort Stewart Team.

On returning from the military, Ron attended Sacramento State University where he majored in physical education and minored in mathematics. He earned his Bachelor of Arts and his California Teaching Credential. Ron returned to Liberty as a mathematics teacher in 1973. In 1973, he was appointed varsity assistant football coach as the offensive coordinator and backfield coach. He served in that position for four years. He resigned from teaching in 1990 and began a career in real estate. Ron was elected to the Liberty Union High School District Board of Trustees and served in that capacity for eight years with one year as president. Ron lives in Brentwood with his wife Judy, who is also a Liberty graduate, and their children Carlyn, Ryan, and Gregory.

It is with a great deal of pleasure and pride that the Liberty Union High School District Athletic Hall of Fame inducts Ronald Enos for his outstanding athletic career as a player and coach at Liberty High School and Diablo Valley College and for his life-long commitment to the Liberty Union High School District.

JEANNE GALLEGOS

Athlete

Jeanne Gallegos attended Liberty High School from 1977 until 1981, and she made an athletic impact starting in her freshman year. As a freshman, she lettered in varsity tennis, JV basketball and varsity track. Jeanne played on the JV basketball team that won the girls' Foothill Athletic League Championship, and she ran on the 1978 track team that was undefeated and won the F.A.L. title as well as the North Coast Section-Division II Championship. Only a freshman, Jeanne was a powerful runner who ran the 100 meter and 200 meter races and ran legs on many relay teams including the 1978 400 meter relay that won gold at the F.A.L. meet. That 400 meter team's record is still unbroken. As a sophomore, Jeanne played and lettered in varsity basketball and was selected Most Valuable Player at the Tracy Tournament. Jeanne again excelled in varsity track and was an all-around asset to the team. She ran on both the 800 meter relay team and the mile relay that set school records that stand yet. At the San Ramon Invitational she took gold in the shot put and ran on the silver winning 400 meter relay team. At the Amador Valley Invitational meet, she placed first in the shot put and was on the gold medal winning 880 yard relay team. The teams she was on also took second in the sprint medley and third in the 440 yard relay. At the F.A.L. meet the 440 yard relay and mile relay teams both earned silver medals. In her junior year, Jeanne continued her two sport dominance. She placed second in the F.A.L. meet in the shot put. Her senior year was when Jeanne really found her niche as a shot putter. In 1981 she placed first in the shot put at the Amador Valley Invitational meet; at the Bob Vincent Invitation, she again won gold in the shot; at West Coast Relays in Fresno she placed fourth. She took first in the shot put at the F.A.L. meet and placed second at the Meet of Champions and went on the California State Meet. She set the Liberty record for the girls' shot put in 1981 with a heave of 41' 21/2" the record still stands. She went on to place fourth in the N.C.S. meet. Jeanne was a qualifier to the North Coast Section Track Meet in either team or individual events for her entire four year high school track career - a tremendous feat. For her athletic endeavors at Liberty, Jeanne was selected as the 1981 Female Athlete of the Year. As a side light of her outstanding athletic prowess, Jeanne was awarded the Presidential Fitness Award - the Gold Award for Lifetime Achievement from 1975 to 1981. After graduating from Liberty, Jeanne went on to Los Medanos College, and in 1982 Jeanne won the gold medal for the shot put at the Junior College State Championships. She also won the bronze medal for her outstanding performance in the Heptathlon - a grueling seven event ordeal that tests all-around track and field ability. Jeanne was selected the Female Athlete of the Year at Los Medanos in 1982. Jeanne lives in Hayward and works for a company in kitchen design.

For her outstanding athletic careers at Liberty High School and at Los Medanos College, the Liberty Union High School District Athletic Hall of Fame is pleased and proud to induct Jeanne Gallegos.



LARRY STONEBARGER

Athlete

Larry Stonebarger was a fine all-around athlete who was one of the toughest competitors in the history of Liberty athletics. His intensity, heart, and pure "guts" were second to no one. As a freshman in 1963, he lettered in Frosh football and was selected as the Most Valuable Player. He was the frosh basketball team captain, and was the frosh baseball team Most Valuable Player. In his sophomore year, Larry was the JV football team captain and Most Valuable Player, and he was the Most Valuable Player on the JV basketball team. As a sophomore he lettered in Varsity baseball and was selected for the Outstanding Team Player Award and second team All-E.B.A.L. As a junior in 1965, Larry played on the undefeated-untied football team where he was the back-up quarterback and a defensive back. He also earned his varsity letter in basketball. On the 1966 varsity baseball team, he was selected first team All-E.B.A.L. and won the Outstanding Hitting Award. During the 1966 football season he was the starting quarterback and a defensive back. He was voted first team All-E.B.A.L. and was the team's Outstanding Back and the winner of the Most Valuable Player Award. That year Larry passed for 878 yards. He received a severely torn knee ligament injury in the last game of the season against Amador for the league title - his injury and inability to play defense was a serious loss to the team and most assuredly cost the team the title. He refused to be taken out on offense. The next morning, he had major surgery. Larry rehabilitated himself and came back to play in the second half of the basketball season. During the 1967 baseball season, Larry was first team All-E.B.A.L. and the team's Most Valuable Player.

After leaving Liberty, Larry went to the University of Idaho and was the starting quarterback on the frosh team. He transferred to Diablo Valley College his sophomore year and was selected first team defense in the Golden Gate



Conference. He was also selected as the Outstanding Player of the Year in G.G.C. His team went to the state playoffs that year. After leaving D.V.C., Larry went on to San Jose State where he was a two-year starter in football on defense. Larry graduated from San Jose State with a B.S. degree in physical education with a minor in sociology. He now lives in Linden where he is the Operations Manager for Sierra Hills Packing Company. He and his wife, Maureen, have three children, Erick, Sally and Suzanne.

For his outstanding achievements in athletics at Liberty High School, at Diablo Valley College and at San Jose State University, the Liberty Union High School District Athletic Hall of Fame is proud to induct Larry Stonebarger. The Continente brothers were an outstanding threesome of fine all-around athletes who blessed Liberty High School from 1974 until 1981. After finishing their college educations, they came back to coach football at Liberty.

Perry, the oldest, attended Liberty from 1974 until 1978. As a freshman, Perry played linebacker, quarterback, and fullback on the frosh team. On a quarterback keeper, he was tackled and tore the ligaments in his right knee which required surgery and ten weeks in a cast. He came back during the spring and lettered in track and field doing the discus and high jump. In his sophomore year, he earned his varsity letter as a tight end in football and played center on the JV basketball team that was the League Co-Champions. In the spring, he was on the JV track team high jumping, throwing the discus and running the high hurdles. In his junior year, he played football as a tight end and linebacker. He was selected All-League as a tight end but again had bad luck. On the first play of the 1976 Homecoming Game, while playing linebacker, he was hit from the side and suffered torn ligaments to his right knee which required surgery and another ten weeks in a cast. On his recovery, he was on the track team in the spring throwing the discus. In his senior year of football, he was the Team Captain and the Most Valuable Player. Perry was on the All-League first team at both tight end and linebacker. He was also selected to the All-East Bay team at tight end. Perry was selected the Parker-Robb Super Sport Player of the Week and also as the Most Valuable Football Player of the year. He played in the Alameda-Contra Costa All-Star Game. He also lettered in varsity basketball his senior year. On graduation from Liberty Perry went on to Los Medanos College where he lettered in football for two years - in 1978 as a tight end and in 1979 as a linebacker. He was chosen the league defensive player of the week


during the 1979 season. On graduating from college in 1984, he came back and helped as an assistant football coach. In 1987, Anthony, David and Perry teamed up to coach the Liberty freshman football team. Perry graduated from Cal Poly State University, San Luis Obispo in 1984 with a B.S. degree in Agricultural Engineering Technology. He lives in San Diego with his lovely wife, Susan, and son, Perry Joe.

The second brother, Anthony, attended Liberty from 1976 until 1980. He earned a frosh football letter and was the Most Valuable Player on the frosh basketball team in 1976-77. He earned varsity track letters for all four years that he was at Liberty. As a sophomore, Anthony lettered in JV football and JV basketball and was the Most Valuable Player on both teams. He played varsity football his junior year and was selected to the second team All-League as free safety. He played varsity basketball again in 1978-79. Anthony lettered and was the Team Captain of the football team that was the League Co-Champions. He was also on the 1977 League Championship Track Team. After graduating from Liberty, Anthony attended Los Medanos College where he lettered for two vears in football as a strong safety - 1980 and 1981. In 1980 he was the C.N.C. Defensive Player of the Week and Honorable Mention All-Conference. Anthony was a Liberty varsity football assistant coach in 1984 and 1985 and a JV assistant coach in 1986. In 1987, he was the Freshman Football Team Head Coach and was assisted by his brothers, Perry and David. Anthony attended Cal Poly State University, San Luis Obispo and graduated in 1985 with a B.S. degree in Agricultural Engineering Technology, and, in 1990, he earned his Master of Business Administration from Cal Poly. Anthony currently lives in Walnut Creek.

The youngest of the three Continente brothers is David who attended Liberty from 1977 until 1981. David played frosh football in



1977 and was the team's Most Valuable Player. The team was the League Champions in 1977. He also lettered in JV basketball and led the team in scoring. In his sophomore year, David played varsity football and was Honorable Mention All-League as a linebacker. He also played varsity basketball and was a part-time starter. As a junior, David played varsity football and was chosen All-League Tight End. He was also selected as All-East Bay as a tight end and All-Northern California as well. He was selected as Liberty's Most Valuable Back and the team was Co-League Champions. He also lettered in varsity track in shot put and discus. It would be difficult to match his junior year's accomplishments as a senior, but he did! As a senior, David was selected All-League Linebacker and was an Honorable Mention All-East Bay Linebacker. He was Team Captain and the Lion's Club Most Valuable Player of 1980. He was a second-team All-League guard in basketball. David was selected to play in the Alameda-Contra Costa All-Star Football Game and received the Liberty High School Outstanding Male Athlete of the Year Award. After high school, David attended Los Medanos College and played football for two years; he played linebacker, tailback, and kicked off. In 1982 he was selected as the Most Valuable Player of the Los Medanos Team. David was recognized and selected as a member of East County's Football Team of the 1980's; he was further honored by being recognized as one of the top ten football players in the 1980's. David graduated from Cal Poly State University San Luis Obispo with a B.S. degree in Business. In 1987, David was an assistant football coach at Liberty. He assisted his brother Anthony -David and Perry both helped coach the frosh team that season. David really had great fun criticizing Anthony for being too conservative in his play calling. He presently resides in



Rocklin, California, with his wife, Linda, and son, Kyle.

Liberty has been fortunate to have had these three brothers who have all been outstanding athletes and coaches who have gone on to be outstanding citizens. It is with extreme pride that we celebrate the induction of the Continente Family into the Liberty Union High School District Athletic Hall of Fame.



JULIE STRANAHAN

Athlete

Julie Stranahan attended Liberty High School from 1987 to 1991. She was an outstanding three-sport athlete whose first love was basketball. She decided to play volleyball to stay in shape for basketball and be with her friends. Because of her outstanding athletic ability, she became an outstanding volleyball player and is Liberty's first ever volleyball player to receive a full scholarship to a college. As a freshman, Julie did not play volleyball. She lettered in JV basketball and was on the varsity track team running the 100 and 200 meter dashes and running a leg of the 400 meter relay. In her sophomore year, Julie played varsity volleyball for the first time, and she was selected as the Most Improved Player. She played varsity basketball and lettered in varsity track running the 100 meters, 200 meters, and was on the 400 meter and the 1600 meter relays as well as participating in the shotput. She qualified for the D.F.A.L. finals in the 400 and 1600 meter relays and the shotput. As a junior, Julie again played varsity volleyball and was selected to second team All-D.F.A.L. and was chosen Liberty Athlete of the Week and received the Academic Award from the C.I.F. In varsity basketball, she was chosen to the All-D.F.A.L. second team and was Liberty's Athlete of the Week and Contra Costa Athlete of the Week. The team took second in the D.F.A.L. playoffs and went to the N.C.S. - C.I.F. playoffs. In track, Julie now concentrated on the weight events - the shotput and the discus throw. She was fifth place in both the shot and the discus at the D.F.A.L. finals and was a N.C.S. qualifier. In her senior year, Julie really came into her full potential. In volleyball, Julie received numerous accolades and was chosen to the All-D.F.A.L. first team. She was Liberty's Co-Most Valuable Player and Co-Captain. In basketball, Julie was selected All-Tournament at the Stonebarger Tournament and selected All-D.F.A.L. and was the Co-Most Valuable D.F.A.L. Basketball Player. She was the Co-Captain of the Lady Lions that tied for first place in the D.F.A.L. and played in N.C.S. playoffs before being eliminated in the second round. In varsity track, Julie was selected Co-Captain of the Liberty team that won the D.F.A.L. title. She placed second in both the shot and discus in the D.F.A.L. finals and placed fourth in the shot and seventh in the discus at the N.C.S. finals. At the Meet of Champions, Julie was eighth in the shot and seventh in the discus. She was chosen Liberty Athlete of the Week and was the Liberty Heptathlon Champion. Julie went on to Los Medanos College after graduating from Liberty. Because of Proposition 13, Los Medanos did not have volleyball, so Julie was allowed to play for Diablo Valley College. She played middle blocker on the Golden Gate Conference and Northern California Junior College Championship Team that went 15-0 for the season and placed eighth in the California Junior College Tournament. She then went back to Los

Medanos and played basketball. She returned to D.V.C. to play volleyball during her sophomore year as starting middle blocker. She was selected to the first team All-Golden Gate Conference. As a result of her stellar play, she received a full scholarship to Metropolitan State College in Denver, Colorado. As a junior at Metro State, Julie was switched from middle blocker to right outside hitter and played in 74 games. She had 41 kills, 43 block assists, 159 digs, and 13 aces. The team won the Colorado Athletic Conference and went on to the Division II - N.C.A.A. playoffs and were eliminated in the third round. Metro State ended the season ranked fourth in the N.C.A.A. -Division II national rankings. During the spring of 1994, the Metro State Team went to Australia to compete in the Australian National Tournament and took first place by beating the Australian National Team. Julie decided to red shirt her senior year at Metro State but returned to the team during her fifth year as one of only two seniors on the team. The team did not have a great season, but Julie was definitely a positive force and seasoned floor leader.

Julie graduated from Metro State College in 1995 with a B.S. degree in Criminal Justice and Criminology. She then attended and graduated from the Los Angeles Police Academy in 1997 and is presently a police officer on the Los Angeles Police Department.



FRANK VONDER AHE

Coach

Coach Frank Vonder Ahe was born in Oregon City, Oregon and went to high school in Hood River, Oregon, where he played quarterback on the football team and competed in other sports. After graduating from Hood River High School, Coach Vonder Ahe went on to the University of Oregon where he played football. He played the guard position on a single wing team - a position that called for a tough, hard-nosed blocker who could pull and lead plays. He graduated from the University of Oregon in 1924 with a B.A. degree and went on to earn his M.A. degree in 1925. He taught at Pilot Rock High School in Oregon teaching mathematics, economics, science, and physical education. In 1926 he worked in the chemistry lab at C&H Sugar in Crockett. In 1927 he worked for Western Sugar in San Francisco as a chemist. He returned to teaching in 1928 at Orland High School where he taught mathematics, science, and physical education. Mr. Vonder Ahe came to Liberty Union High School in 1929 and taught mathematics, chemistry, physics, and physical education. He served as the varsity basketball, track, and baseball coach for many years - sometimes coaching both the varsity and lightweight teams at the same time. In 1935 he became Liberty's first football coach and coached successfully for twelve years and then came back in 1949 to take over the season when the coach left. His record for twelve-plus years was an amazing 49 wins, 35 losses, and 12 ties. Many of those years were 'the beginning of the program years' and many were World War II years when his teams were decimated due to students going into the service to serve their country - not a really big deal for large schools, but a horrific problem for small schools. He coached and developed many



outstanding players such as Art Honegger, Bob DalPorto, Bill Bunn, Dale Halbert and Art Allen. Coach Vonder Ahe also served as the athletic director until 1950. Mr. Vonder Ahe served as vice-principal for many years and then became principal and served in that capacity until his retirement. He was a charter member of the Brentwood Lions, a member of the Brentwood Volunteer Fire Department and a member of the Brentwood Rotary.

Mr. Vonder Ahe and his wife Bertha had two sons, Donn and Jerry, who were fine athletes and students who both went on to become dentists. Coach Vonder Ahe and his wife Bertha are both deceased.

It is with great pride that we celebrate the induction of Coach Frank Vonder Ahe into the Liberty Union High School District Athletic Hall of Fame for his long and impressive athletic and educational contributions to Liberty Union High School.


MATTHEW WILGENBUSH

Athlete

Matt Wilgenbush was one of the finest basketball players to ever grace the hardwoods at Liberty High School. The 6'8" Lion center was a dominating force in the middle - a pillar of strength on Coach Jerry Miller's great Lion teams of the 1980's. Matt was one of only a very few players to ever earn a varsity basketball letter for four years. As a sophomore, Matt played noseguard on the Liberty football team until he injured his back. The injury forced him out of football and was serious enough to affect his basketball playing during his junior year. Matt won many honors during his playing days at Liberty - some of those are as follows: Parker Robb Supersport of the Month in both 1982 and 1983; He was chosen the Parker Robb Supersport Most Valuable Player for the 1982-83 year; He was chosen to the Foothill Athletic League All-League Teams in 1981-82 and 1982-83; He was the F.A.L. Most Valuable Player in 1982 and the Oakland Tribune's F.A.L. Athlete of Year in basketball in 1983. Matt was selected to numerous all-tourney teams; some of the more prestigious were the John F. Kennedy 16th and 17th Annual Basketball Classic in 1981-82 and 1982-83, the North Coast Section C.I.F. 2A Basketball Tournament in 1981-82 and 1982-83. The Lions played in the North Coast Section C.I.F. Class AA Boys' Basketball Championships in 1981-82 and 1982-83. Matt was selected to the All-East Bay Basketball first team in both 1981-82 and 1982-83 seasons. He was chosen to the San Francisco Examiner - Bay Area Basketball All-Stars. He was a nominee for the Oakland Tribune Prep of the Year Award in 1983 and was an All-Northern California choice. Matt was also picked on McDonald's All-American High School Basketball Team in 1983. He was selected as the Kaiser Aluminum East Bay High School Player of the Week in February of 1982. Needless to say, Matt was the Liberty High School Most Valuable Basketball Player in 1981-82 and in 1982-83. He was also chosen the Liberty Male Athlete of the Year in 1983. Matt averaged 17.5 points and 9.5 rebounds as a junior and averaged 18.5 points and 11.5 rebounds per game as a senior shooting 62 percent from the

floor and 68 percent from the foul line. He had high games of 30 points and 18 rebounds. After high school, Matt was offered scholarships from every PAC-10 college except U.C.L.A. He also received many other offers from schools in other conferences. He chose to attend University of Santa Clara in the West Coast Conference where he was a four-year letterman. His best game while at Santa Clara came against the only PAC-10 school to not offer him a scholarship - U.C.L.A. He scored 16 points and had 15 rebounds against them at Pauley Pavilion. Santa Clara went to the NCAA playoffs one year and made two appearances at National Invitational Tournament. Matt was the team captain the second year. Matt graduated from Santa Clara in 1987 with a Bachelor of Science degree in economics. Matt lives in Oakley and has a daughter, Taylor.

It is with a great deal of pleasure and pride that the Liberty Union High School District Athletic Hall of Fame inducts Matthew Wilgenbush for his outstanding accomplishments and contributions to Liberty High School and Santa Clara University basketball.
