


Scott Barnes

Athlete

Scott Barnes attended Liberty High School from 1977 to 1980. He became an impact basketball player immediately upon entering Liberty as a sophomore transfer. Scott was a three year letter winner in varsity basketball. He was a unanimous choice All-Foothill Athletic League selection in 1978-79 and was again chosen in 1979-80. He was also selected as the Most Valuable Player in the F.A.L. in the 1979-80 season. He was captain of the Liberty team that was the co-champions of the F.A.L. in 1979-80. Scott was selected to both the All-East Bay Team and the All Northern California Team in 1979-80. He was the M.V.P. for Liberty for two years and capped his high school career by being chosen as the Yearbook Award Winner in 1980 as Liberty's Outstanding Male Athlete.

After leaving Liberty, Scott went to Eastern Montana College in Billings, Montana on a basketball scholarship and started several games as a freshman. During his sophomore year Scott was the second leading rebounder and scorer on the team. He had a 30 point game against Alaska Anchorage. His team reached the NCAA Tournament both years. Scott decided to transfer to Fresno State University in 1982 and sat out the 1982-83 as a red shirt. In 1983-84 Scott started on the ninth ranked preseason team in the nation as a junior. Fresno beat Akeem Olajuwon's Houston Cougars; Scott held Akeem scoreless in the first half and held him to a total of 12 points for the game. Scott was the third leading scorer and second in rebounding on the Bulldog PCAA Tournament Championship Team. Scott also set a single season shot block record with 48 blocks. He was second in the number of dunks in a season and anchored the nation's top ranked defense. He was chosen the team's New Comer of the Year. During Scott's senior year in 1984-85, he led the team in rebounding and was second in scoring averaging 13.5 points per game. He was chosen second team All-Conference and All-District. He was also chosen PCAA Player of the Week and had an average of 19 points per game during the 1985 run to the National Invitational Tournament quarter finals. Scott was honored by the Bulldog Team by being selected Co-Captain; won the Top Rebounder Award; and was awarded the Bulldog Inspirational Player Award.

After college Scott was drafted in the first roundthird overall pick by the La Cross Catbirds in the 1985 Continental Basketball Association draft. He was also drafted in the third round by the West Chester Golden Apples of the United States Basketball League and received a free agent tryout for the L.A. Clippers Veteran Camp. Scott




chose to play overseas for the ASC Gottingen in the Division I German League where he was the second leading scorer and the top rebounder. While in college Scott majored in physical education and earned both a B.A. and a M.A. degree in physical education with special emphasis on athletic administration. In 1988-89, Scott was the General Manager for the Fresno Flames of the World Basketball League. 1989-90 found him at the University of San Diego as the Director of Athletic Development. From 1990 until 1995 Scott was an Associate Athletic Director for External Affairs and Executive Director of the Pacific Athletic Foundation at University of Pacific in Stockton. From 1995 to 1997. he was the Associate Director for Development and Special Projects at Iowa State University in Ames, Iowa. In 1997 he became Athletic Director at Humboldt State University in Arcata, California. Scott became the Athletic Director of Eastern Washington University in Cheney, Washington in August of 1999. He has returned to his roots - being a native of Washington born in Spokane. He resides in Cheney, Washington, with his wife Jody and their two children, Milenna and īsaac.

The Liberty Union High School District Athletic Hall of Fame is very proud and honored to induct Scott Barnes into the Hall of Fame for his outstanding athletic career at Liberty and for his collegiate career at Fresno State and on the professional level and his continuing distinguished career as a collegiate athletic director.

Albert Celoni

Athlete

Al Celoni attended Liberty High School from 1952 until 1956. He left a legacy of outstanding athletic ability and a desire to be great. He lettered in football, basketball, and baseball while at Liberty and became an outstanding performer in all of the sports. He first lettered in frosh football and then went on to earn varsity letters for the next three years. He played end and went both ways. He was a fine offensive blocker and pass receiver as an offensive end, and as a defensive player, he was a very strong performer against the run and an excellent pass rusher. At the end of his senior year in 1956, he was nominated to play in the West Bay vs. East Bay All-Star game in Kezar Stadium in San Francisco. Al lettered for three years as a varsity basketball player. He was a fine shot from the field and a great rebounder who played defense with great tenacity. He was strong, tough, and quick and always played with intensity. As fine a player as Al was in both football and basketball, it was in baseball where he was the most natural. He was an outstanding pitcher on Lou Bronzan's teams of 1954-'55-'56. In 1956, Al had a record as a pitcher of nine wins and three losses as well as having a batting average of .243 on the Co-Championship team of the East Bay Division of the Diablo Valley Athletic League. Al was named the



Outstanding Baseball Player of the team that year. The 1956 team beat Pacifica High School 18-0, and in this game Al, Ralph Mendoza, and Bob Cecchini combined to pitch a perfect game - a no run, no hit and no runner reached first base. Al lives in Discovery Bay with his wife Carole. They have three children and five grandsons.

The Liberty Union High School District Athletic Hall of Fame is honored and proud to induct Albert Celoni for his outstanding athletic career at Liberty High School.








George Del Pozo

Athlete

George Del Pozo attended Liberty High School from 1942 until 1946. While at Liberty, he was an outstanding all-around athlete. As a freshman, he earned his J.V. Letter in football. He went on to play on the varsity football team for three years playing on offense as a running back and as a safety on defense. In basketball George played J.V. basketball for his frosh and sophomore years and then went on to letter on the varsity team for two years where he was most often the high point man. Baseball was probably George's best sport, but because of the war years, Liberty did not have an interscholastic team. During George's senior year, baseball with team competition was resumed, and he lettered in varsity baseball playing shortstop, third baseman, and pitcher. George also competed in varsity track and ran the 100-yard dash, ran on the 440 yard relay, and pole vaulted. Again, because there was no interschool competition during the war years, George won the school intramural tennis championship for fours years straight. He repeated the same feat in doubles with his partner Betty White. George also participated in and was on the intramural tumbling team. After graduating from high school in 1946, George entered the U.S. Navy, and at the U.S. Naval Training Center, he played three games of football for the Navy team. On his first ship, the U.S.S. Curtis, George was the playing manager of the ship's baseball and basketball teams. During the Korean war, he served on the U.S.S. Philippine Sea until he was discharged in 1952. George rejoined his old softball and baseball teams - the Antioch Merchants - after his naval service. They played softball three nights a week and baseball on Sunday. The Antioch Merchants won the Antioch City Championships in softball for 10 straight years and were Contra



Costa County Champions five of those 10 years. George was an outstanding fielding shortstop with great range who could cover plenty of ground and had a rifle arm. George had speed and could stretch singles into doubles if he saw opposing outfielders napping. George was small in stature, but he carried a "big stick" - batting for a .416 average in softball and a .426 average in baseball in the same season. He was selected three times as the best shortstop in Contra Costa County. After his team sport competition, George took up the game of golf at 38 years of age and within five years was a 6 handicap. At the age of 72, he still plays to a 7.5 to 8 handicap.

The Liberty Union High School District Athletic Hall of Fame is proud and honored to induct George Del Pozo for his outstanding athletic career at Liberty High School, the U.S. Navy, and with the Antioch Merchants.

The 1969 Liberty Lions football team was one of the finest to ever wear the cardinal and gold. In 64 years of Liberty football, there have been only three undefeated teams - the 1969 team was the last team to accomplish that feat - 30 years ago! The only blemishes on its otherwise perfect season were a nonleague tie with a powerful Irvington team and a league tie with the Amador Dons of Pleasanton. The team was the E.B.A.L. Co-Champions along with Amador. This team showed desire and drive from its first victory over arch rival Antioch. Every team member played with great intensity, effort, focus, and desire both on the practice field and on the playing field. They were champions because they played like champions and refused to accept anything short of that - witness the fact that the team scored 12 points in the final 6 minutes to come from behind to tie Amador for the title. This phenomenal comeback was led by senior captain and right guard John


Rogers. This defensive standout broke through the line and stole a Don handoff and scampered 25 yards for the first touchdown to get the drive underway. Just four minutes later, halfback Steve Capozzo knotted the score with a five yard run up the middle after captain Frank Rosas had taken a 25 yard pass and run from Jim Honegger to set up the Lions on the five yard line. Steve Capozzo led the team defensively with two interceptions and a fumble recovery plus four offensive catches for 36 yards. Liberty led the defending champion Dons in statistics - in first downs 10 to 8, passing yardage 133 to 12, and total yards 242 to 144. Eight team members made the E.B.A.L. All-League Teams in 12 positions.

The Liberty Union High School District Athletic Hall of Fame is proud and honored to induct this outstanding football team and its players, managers, and coaches for their hard work, dedication, and outstanding record.

Donald Morse

Athlete



Don Morse attended Liberty High School from 1949 until 1953 where he was an outstanding all-around athlete who earned varsity letters in four sports. In his freshman and sophomore years, Don earned "B" team letters in basketball. Also, in 1951, he earned his first varsity award in baseball. During his junior year Don earned varsity letters in baseball, basketball, and football. Don played guard on the 1951 undefeated football team that has been inducted into the Hall of Fame. He was a fine offensive line blocker who was skilled at getting off the ball quickly and opening holes in the defensive line. During his senior year, Don really showed his athletic versatility by lettering in four varsity sports football, basketball, baseball, and swimming. He was an integral part of all of those teams and is one of the select few who have been able to successfully letter in four varsity sports. As a basketball player, Don was a point guard who had an excellent outside shot and was able to drive to the basket as well as feed the ball to his teammates. He was a quick and tough defensive player who was a team leader. In baseball, Don was an outstanding catcher with great defensive skills and a fine throwing arm that made him invaluable to the team. Don was a member of the Block "L" Society for three years. After his high school days Don went on to play fast-pitch softball and baseball for several local teams, and he played basketball in the Brentwood Recreation League. Don now lives in Brentwood with his wife Yvonne.

For his outstanding athletic career at Liberty High School, the Liberty Union High School District Athletic Hall of Fame is both proud and honored to induct Donald Morse.



The Rios Family

From 1967 until 1978 Liberty was very fortunate to have the athletic prowess of the four Rios brothers. Roy, the eldest, lettered in frosh football and J.V. baseball as a freshman. He earned his varsity wrestling letter and placed in the league meet. As a sophomore, Roy lettered in varsity football and varsity wrestling and placed at the league level and was a North Coast qualifier. In his junior year Roy was a starter at fullback on the 1969 undefeated Co-Championship football team and also earned his varsity wrestling letter and was league champion. He was a North Coast Section semi-finalist. In his senior year Roy earned his varsity football letter as a starting fullback, defensive tackle, and a member of the special teams. He was again the league champion in wrestling. Roy was a North Coast finalist and a state qualifier with a 23-2-1 record. He was selected as Liberty's Most Valuable Wrestler. After high school, Roy attended Diablo Valley College and wrestled. In 1971-72 he was a Golden State Conference finalist placing second. He was also Northern California J.C. third place medalist and qualified for the J.C. State Championship Tourney. He won the DVC Most Inspirational award. In his 1972-73 season at DVC Roy placed fourth in the Golden Gate Conference, and at Northern California J.C. Tournament he placed fifth. He placed in every tournament he entered and was voted team captain and won the "Pin King" award. Roy attended Montana State University, and in 1973-74, he placed third in the Division I Big Sky Conference Wrestling Tournament. Roy "red shirted" his 1974-75 season and enrolled at Chico State University where in 1975-76, he was a Far Western Conference third place medalist - losing to the defending

Raymond was the third brother to participate in athletics at Liberty. Ray was strictly a wrestler and a very good one. He earned his varsity letter as a freshman in 1973. As a sophomore, Ray was a league finalist and a North Coast Section semi-finalist. In his junior season of 1975-76, Ray had a league record of 6-2 and was the league champion and a North Coast Section finalist. He was selected as Liberty's Most Valuable Wrestler. During the 1976-77 season Ray had a dual meet record of 12-0. He was a league finalist and a North Coast Section semi-finalist - which made him a three time North Coast Section qualifier. He was named the outstanding wrestler at weight class at the Granada Wrestling Invitational. He was chosen co-captain and was again selected as the Most Valuable Wrestler. From 1985 until 1990 Ray served as a volunteer assistant wrestling coach at Liberty.

Ruben was the last of the four brothers to attend Liberty and participate in athletics. As a freshman, Ruben played and lettered in frosh football as a starting linebacker. He earned his varsity letter in wrestling as a freshman. In his sophomore year, Ruben lettered in football on the L.V. tearn



National Champion 7-5. He was a NCAA Division II qualifier. Roy served as Liberty's Assistant Varsity Wrestling Coach from 1984 to 1993 - during which the team won two North Coast Section Championships. From 1994 to the present time, Roy has been serving as the J.V. Wrestling Coach and Assistant Varsity Coach. His teams have won two Bay Valley Athletic League titles and were North Coast Section runner-ups.

Richard was the second brother to attend Liberty. He was a starting fullback on the frosh football team and the captain of the team. He played and lettered in J.V. basketball as a sophomore. Rick played varsity football for three years and during his junior and senior years was the starting fullback. During his sophomore season, Rich received a devastating injury that cut his season short - he was hospitalized for abdominal surgery.

as a linebacker, and he played varsity baseball as an outfielder. Ruben wrestled on the varsity team and took second place in the league and was a North Coast Section qualifier. Ruben's junior year was a disaster due to a shoulder injury, but he was still able to earn his varsity letter in wrestling. In his senior year, Ruben was back in form and was the starting linebacker and co-captain on the varsity football team. Even though his season record in wrestling was not up to his previous best, he was still able to earn his varsity letter making him the third brother to earn a varsity letter in wrestling for four years. Ruben served as assistant wrestling coach from 1984 until 1994. All of the brothers are currently living in the Liberty Union High School District raising families of their own. They are all very successful and outstanding citizens and leaders. Liberty is blessed to have had this outstanding family among its alumni.

It is with extreme pride that we celebrate the induction of the Rios Family into the Liberty Union High School District Athletic Hall of Fame: for their outstanding athletic careers and their service to Liberty High School.


