Cal State Universities (CSU)



- Is the nation's largest four-year public university, with 23 campuses and eight off-campus centers.
- Stretches 800 miles from Humboldt in the north to San Diego in the south.
- Educates the most ethnically, economically and academically diverse student body in the nation.
- Is renowned for the quality of its teaching and preparing job-ready graduates.
- Educates approximately 486,000 students.
- Has conferred degrees on more than 3.9 million living alumni.

Western Undergraduate Exchange (WUE)

America's largest regional interstate tuition savings program

The Western Undergraduate Exchange (WUE) is an agreement among WICHE's 16 member states and territories, through which 160+ participating public colleges and universities provide steep nonresident tuition savings for Western students.

Through WUE, eligible students can choose from hundreds of undergraduate programs outside their home state, and pay no more than 150 percent of that institution's resident tuition rate.

Since full nonresident college-tuition rates may exceed 300 percent of resident rates, WUE increases affordable higher-education choices for students, and minimizes the adverse impacts of student loan debt.

Saving through WUE is simple.


Building your college list

- **1 Reach School**: Your academic qualifications are **below** the average accepted student, and/or a selective school that only admits 20-30% of applicants. Beware that many UC Schools now fall into this range.
- <u>2 Good Fit/ 'Middle of the Road' Schools</u>: Your transcript mirrors that of the average freshman. Therefore, your GPA, SAT/ACT scores and coursework are all on par with those typically admitted.
- **1 Safety School:** one in which your academic credentials far **exceed** those of the average accepted student. (*Cal State East Bay or San Francisco State*)



- Associate's degrees / degrees for transfer
- Multiple ways to transfer to 4-year Universities
- Certification programs, trade programs

Financial Aid FAFSA (Free Application for Student Aid) or CA Dream Act Application

- Start after October 1st
- For 4-year college and community colleges
- Helps you qualify for grants, loans, scholarships, and work study
- Cal Grant
- Local scholarship
- Outside scholarships



FAFSA vs. CA Dream Act

- 1. You are eligible to complete the FAFSA at www.fafsa.ed.gov if you are a:
 - U.S Citizen
 - Permanent Resident
 - Eligible non-citizen
 - T Visa holder
- 2. You are eligible to complete the CADAA at https://dream.csac.ca.gov if you are:
 - Undocumented
 - Have a valid or expired DACA
 - U Visa holders
 - Have Temporary Protected Status (TPS)



Things to do NOW if attending 4-year college after high school

- √ Begin/continue college research

- √ Visit schools during summer and fall break
- ✓ Narrow your college selection to at least 4 schools
- ✓ Register to take or retake SAT/ACT if required by your intended school
- √ Sign up for NCAA eligibility center if you plan on playing college level sport

Things to do now if attending CC, Vocational Schools or joining military

- ✓ Begin/ continue researching programs of interest
- ✓ Take the ASVAB for Career Guidance and/or if you are planning to join the military, sign up in the college and career center next year
- Consider taking a class at LMC over the summer to get started with the process
